

The aim is to encourage **cooperation across borders** that would not happen without help from the cohesion policy.

- cross-border cooperation programmes along internal EU borders ERDF contribution: 5.6 billion EUR
- transnational cooperation programmes cover larger areas of cooperation such as the Baltic Sea and central European regions. ERDF contribution: 1.8 billion EUR
- interregional cooperation programme (INTERREG IVC) and 3 networking programmes (Urbact II, Interact II and ESPON) covering all 27 Member States of the EU. They provide a framework for exchanging experience between regional and local bodies in different countries. *ERDF contribution: 445 million EUR*





- carry out pilot investments and actions
- leverage additional money and investment
- come up with new economic strategies and involve local communities
- increase efficiency on various levels
- improve spending of public money
- support the adaptation of EU directives to regional contexts
- strengthen regional networks and involve local communities
- influence the policy agenda on all political levels





Cooperating across borders to make our cities and regions a better place to live and work

The CENTRAL EUROPE Programme is funded under the European Regional Development Fund (ERDF). It invests EUR 231 million to provide funding to transnational cooperation projects involving both public and private organisations.

8 languages

9 countries

80 cities and regions

124 projects funded

1331 partners cooperating in our projects

150 million people benefitting from our work

The CENTRAL EUROPE Programme runs from 2007 to 2013 and funds projects in six thematic areas:

Demographic change and knowledge development








Cooperation links and projects in the CENTRAL EUROPE Programme






The preparatory steps

The preparation of the new Programme builds on solid knowledge of:


- ✓ Common challenges and shared needs characterising the whole Programme area;
- ✓ **Potentials** for a smart, sustainable and inclusive growth of the central European regions.



In-depth **territorial analysis** carried out in 2012, based on desk researches and direct involvement of stakeholders (on-line survey, interviews).


